



The South Carolina Department of Environmental Services has made a final The South Carolina Department of Environmental Services has made a final decision that the proposed expansion of the Dillon County Class 2 Landfill is consistent with the requirements of the DON regulations, the Dillon County and state solid waste management plans as a commercial landfill, and the buffer requirements. The Department also confirmed receipt of a zoning approval letter.

This decision becomes the final agency decision thirty (30) days from the date of the mailing of the decision (August 15, 2024) unless an appeal is made in accordance with S.C. Code Ann. \S 48-6-30(D)(2), which states:

Within thirty calendar days after the mailing of a decision [pursuant to S.C. Code Ann.§ 48-6-30(D)(1)], an applicant, permittee, licensee, certificate holder, or affected person desiring to contest the department decision may request a contested case hearing before the Administrative Law Court, in secondment with the Administrative Decodures Act. request a contested case hearing before the Adminis accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act.



The grant is primarily designed to support increased child enrollment, staff and educator retention, and child care center operating expenses. "Our goal is to support child care providers in their efforts to expand and enhance the quality of care for children across our state," said DSS State Director Michael Leach. "This grant is just another example of signifi-cant steps DSS has made over the last ford vable, high-qual-ity child care." 

Pay close attention to low-lying areas, containers, and debris where water might linger. Check for Standing Water: Inspect gutters, downspouts, flowerpot saucers, birdbaths, and any other receptacles that could hold water. Even small amounts of stagnant water can become breeding grounds for mosquitoes. mosquitoes. Evaluate Flood Damage:

City Of Dillon Council Meeting Focused On Tropical Storm Debby: Preparations, Challenges, **And Future Plans**

By Vickie Rogers At the Dillon City Council meeting on Monday, August 12th, the primary topic of dis-cussion was Tropical Storm Debby and its impact on the community. Mayor Tally McColl addressed the council and residents, highlighting the storm's effects and the city's response during his Mayor's Report. Mayor McColl began his report by acknowledging the serious nature of Tropical Storm Debby and its impact on Dillon. "Anytime we have a weather even like that, it really impacts our community and the City of Dillon, and it's taken

weather even like that, it really impacts our community and the City of Dillon, and it's taken really seriously," McColl stat-ed. He emphasized the city's vulnerability due to its low-lying geography, which inevitably leads to flooding during heavy rainfall. Despite the preparedness, McColl acknowledged that some homes experienced water intrusion and localized flood-ing. He emphasized the city's commitment to addressing these issues promptly, stating.

"Any time that a single citizen has to move out of their home, then that's one home too

many." McColl noted that while the city's infrastructure—both old and new—could only handle a

limited amount of water at a time, the damage from the storm was less severe than anticipated. He credited the rel-atively mild impact to a combi-nation of factors: the storm was less intense than expected, and the city was well-prepared. McColl detailed the exten-sive efforts made by the city in response to the storm. He praised City Manager Glen Wagner and departments for their exceptional work in preparing for and managing the

Wagner and departments for their exceptional work in preparing for and managing the situation. The city mobilized quickly, coordinating with county and state emergency management officials. Regular meetings were held to discuss the evolving situation and plan for various scenarios. The city also hosted two swift water rescue teams at the City Fire Department to assist with emergencies. Crews worked diligently to clean and re-clean storm drains, ensuring that water could flow as intend-ed and reducing the potential for flooding. McColl expressed gratitude to the community for their patience and support during the cresis. He highlighted the hard work of city employees and

crisis. He highlighted the hard work of city employees and encouraged residents to thank them if they encountered them. He also praised the collective efforts of the community, not-

ing, "By the grace of God, we were spared what could have been a very devastating even if . City Manager Glen Wagner provided insights into ongoing the city's resilience against flooding. Wagner reported that the Office of Resilience had awarded Dillon \$4 million a vara and a half ago, which recently increased to \$8 mil-lion. Despite these funds, the projected costs for necessary improvements are estimated at around \$14 million. The project is nearing the bidding stage, with a meeting scheduled to review details on Thursday. Wagner and his team con-ducted a thorough inspection of the city following the storm. They observed that some areas, such as Lucius Road and South Fourth Avenue, drained effec-tively, while others, like the ara around 11th and Calionun behind City Hall, faced signifi-ron these problematic areas using a three-inch pump. Wagner proposed exploring bumps, which can significantly accelerate water removal. They obsender the store of the avent of 10,000 gallons per minute, could be rented or pur-

chased to address particularly stubborn flooding issues. The estimated cost for a four-inch pump is \$100,000, and a 14-inch pump is \$200,000. Wagner suggested that acquiring two of these pumps could enhance the city's ability to manage flood-waters more effectively. The storm delivered approxi-mately eight and a half inches of rain from Tuesday to Thursday, with five inches falling in just six hours. This intense rainfall contributed to the flooding challenges faced by the city.


